Rehab collaborative learning session one – March 2021

The importance of whānau and consumer-centred care was the focus of the first learning session for the major trauma rehab collaborative, recently held in Wellington.

Guest speakers and facilitators included Andy Philips, (chief allied health professions officer at Hawke's Bay DHB), Deon York (Commission's Partners in Care team) and Sharon Pihema (Commission's trauma programme).

The Commission's quality improvement advisors involved in the collaborative introduced teams to useful tools for their projects. These included HEAT (Health Equity Assessment Tool), aim statements and driver diagrams, measures, and guidance for assessing improvement and change.

The learning session was a positive start to the collaborative, and a second learning session is scheduled for June 2021.

Trauma Networkz programme 2021/22

This year nine courses have been successfully held in different Emergency Departments, with over 300 clinicians from ambulance, ED and other specialities attending. The simulation environment allows issues such as processes, logistics, equipment and team communication to be identified and addressed. The feedback from participants is overwhelmingly positive and is resulting in tangible changes to be made. The courses will continue to be rolled out over the next 18 months.
